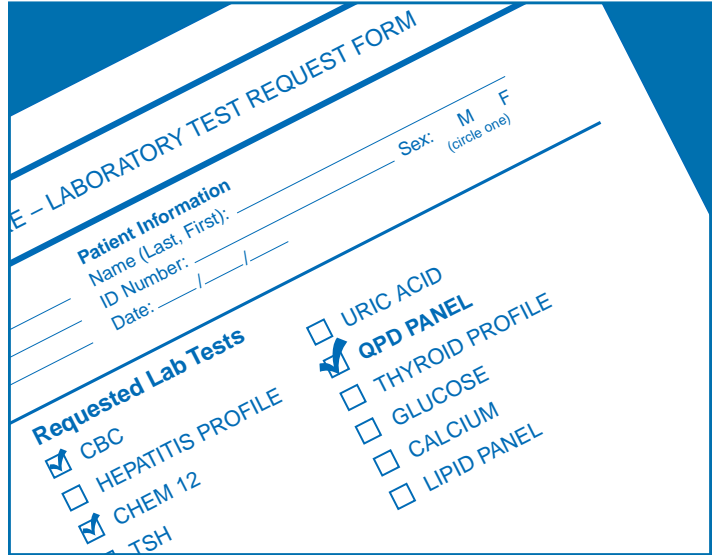

When the patient finishes, you put the tablet on a docking station connected to a printer. You immediately get a computer-generated report, with severity scores, specific DSM-IV diagnoses, and a list of the symptoms leading to the diagnosis. That’s all there is to it.

Because that is how you treat it. It is as simple as ordering a Chem 12. The report even looks like a lab report.
